INTRODUCTION

SHIVRAJ COLLEGE OF ARTS, COMMERCE AND D.S.KADAM SCIENCE COLLEGE, GADHINGLAJ TAL.-GADHINGLAJ, DIST- KOLHAPUR- 416 502 (MAHARASHTRA)

Shivraj College of Arts, Commerce and D.S.Kadam Science College, Gadhinglaj was established by Late.Hon.Shri.V.T.Patil (M.P.) the president of Tararani Vidyapith, Kolhapur on 26th June 1964. Later on it was handed over to the present Sanstha, Karmveer Vitthal Ramaji Shinde Shikshan Sanstha Gadhinglaj, Dist.-Kolhapur under the leadership of Late Hon.Shri.Balasaheb Mane (M.P.) on 23rd April 1973. At present the Sanstha is working under the able guidance of Hon.Shri.K.V.Kurade. The motto of our institution is "Service to community itself is a Supreme religion". It implies the purpose and objectives of education.

The college was started with Arts and Commerce faculties at initial stage. Later on in 1982 the faculty of science was introduced as the demand of the southern part of Kolhapur district. To cope-up with National and global needs, self financing courses like B.B.A., B.C.A., B.C.S. and B.Sc.Computer were started from 1999. Additionally we are running at present various career oriented courses.

The college is situated in the hilly, region on Maharashtra-Karnataka border area. The college has got 33,300sq.m of eco-friendly premise of its own where the academic, administrative buildings, the huge playground, multipurpose hall (under construction), Ladies hostel (under construction) and Gymkhana are situated.

The college has permanent affiliation of Shivaji University, Kolhapur and is included in the list of 2(f) and 12 (b) under UGC.

Our college was accredited on 16th February 2004 by NAAC in its first cycle with 'B' Grade. We are submitting this RAR for second cycle of accreditation and assessment.



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In the first accreditation, the college is ranked with grade "**B**" by NAAC. Since then the institute has tried its best to comply the suggestions of Peer Team before facing the second phase of reaccreditation. The college has given more attention to the key aspects related to seven criteria. The efforts made are:

- The college has given enough attention to fulfil and execute the curricular aspects like its designing, development, planning and implementation. Some of our faculty members are working as member of-BOS and various sub-committees, in designing and revising the university syllabi. Accordingly our academic calendar is prepared and executed and efforts are made to give full justice to the same.
- Teaching-Learning and Evaluation' being the core aspect of higher education, highest attention is given for its planning and execution. Ours is unique college that gives open admissions, irrespective of academic merit of students. The college is keen on enriching and elevating teaching learning process. Enough infrastructure, Space, Light, Water, provisions are made for effective teaching learning process. Faculties are encouraged for attending Refresher Courses/Orientation Courses/Workshops/Seminars/Conferences. For better classroom teaching ICT is provided whenever required. The college uses evaluation system and arranges internal evaluation to monitor the progress.
- The college provides and facilitates all possible resources to promote research culture amongst the faculties. They are encouraged to attend seminars, workshops and activities related to research. There are 22-Ph.D. holders, 17-NET/SET/M.Phil. Degree holders and 8 faculties have registered for Ph.D. The college has four faculties working as research guides. Our laboratory is recognised for M.Phil. /Ph.D. in Physics and Chemistry. Our library has been used by many researchers and they are benefited accordingly.
- The college maintains the overall 33,300 sq.mts campus neatly. College has provided enough and adequate infrastructure which facilitates the educational activities. To keep the pace with academic development the institution has undertaken new constructions and renovation of some existing buildings.
- The college has a large playground with 400 meter running track, an indoor games complex and Girls hostel are under construction. Enough space is provided for Library stack and reading room. Library is computerised and faculty members are registered with N-List, INFLIBNET consortium, Ahmadabad. It has e-book facility and has

special section for competitive exams. Open access is provided to third year degree and P.G. students are encouraged to do minor projects and to publish research articles. We have well-equipped computer labs in addition the college has recognised research lab for Physics and Chemistry.

- The college is keen and careful about the overall development of students. To fulfil their needs college has guidance counselling cell, placement cell and there is also a grievance redressal cell working actively. The college runs several career oriented and remedial courses. Ours has been a reputed college due to excellent university examination results. Some of our students are university rankers. There is considerable number of students that seek admission to P.G. courses. For the development of students' personality, units like N.S.S., N.C.C and Gymkhana work actively. The college always promotes the value based education for the students. The activities like SACS, Annual social, Blood Donation camps are arranged for them.
- The Karmveer Vitthal Ramaji Shinde Shikshan Sanstha runs the college under the able guidance of President Shri.K.V.Kurade effectively. The organizational culture is built through the working of Governing council, L.M.C. and IQAC. The Sanstha provides the autonomy to the Principal in day-to-day working. At the beginning of every academic year, the plans and policies are discussed in IQAC meetings. The Santsha and IQAC make maximum efforts to provide clear vision and mission for the smooth and effective working of the college. Budgeting and utilization of finance are considered key aspects in the working of the organization. The income and expenditure of the institution have clear accountability and it is reflected in audits.
- The institution has made all possible innovative efforts to achieve academic excellence. It has benefited the institution in creating the interest of students for quality assurance. Efforts are made to create innovative sensibility for environmental issues like energy conservation; rain-water harvesting and carbon neutrality. We would like to cite two best practices that have brought reputation to the college. The college has very rich convention in the field of games and sports. Our gymkhana and the large playground have contributed in producing the state, national and international level players. The Shivraj Association of Computer Students (SACS) arranges various competitions and Quizzes in the annual meet. Due to this, the students get exposure the computer related knowledge and skills are sure that they would cope- up with global standard.

The admission process is carried out by forming admission committee chaired by Principal, including Heads of departments and few senior faculty members. The members of admission committee and Principal counsel the students and parents in choosing academic courses. Students are admitted as per the Shivaji University norms.

For open category, the students are admitted on first come first serve basis. The reserved candidates are selected as per Government rules and regulation. Admissions are given to all eligible students.

General:

For conventional undergraduate courses, the students are admitted as per their choice. In the admission process, priority is given to in-house students. The admission process continues till the date and norms given by Shivaji University. Students are selected for various courses based on merit and minimum eligibility conditions at the qualifying examination. The college does not have any cutoff merit for these conventional undergraduate courses.

a) **Professional :**

For self financing courses like B.B.A., B.C.A., B.C.S. and M.B.A. University conducts CET and students are admitted in the college as per preference given by the students. From the academic year 2012-13 university has cancelled CET except M.B.A. of YCMOU, so all interested students are eligible to take the admission.

Admissions to the post graduate courses in Arts (English, Marathi, and Economics) and Commerce (M.Com.) are based on first come first served basis.

b) Vocational – Nil

Students who have passed the qualifying examination (12th or equivalent examination) are considered eligible for admission at entry level.

As per motto of institute, the qualified and willing students approaching the college are admitted. There is no cutoff mark system for admission. As a result, the students from all socio-economic sections of society are admitted.

More number of women candidates has sought admissions. The college makes all sorts of efforts to teach and serve the students coming from different backgrounds and abilities. The institute never denies admission to them but provides some additional facilities to economically weaker section students. The facility is given in the payment of fees installments.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The college has a policy to fulfill the needs of differently-abled students. The college has always tried to bring the differently-abled students to common level, through the provisions of extra facilities within the limits of the Institute. As far as possible the allotment of classrooms is made on the ground floor and ramp structure is provided for the physically handicapped students.

Special provision is made for such students in library, in study room and reference sections. Library and laboratory staff assists such students whenever required.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Every teacher tests the knowledge and skills of the students during introductory lectures and then review of the last year's syllabus is taken.

The knowledge and skills are assessed on the basis of results of previous examinations and overall performance of the students in the traditional courses; Teachers slow down the teaching pace until the students are acquainted to the new syllabi. Skill and knowledge level of the students seeking admissions to the self financing courses like B.B.A., B.C.A. and B.C.S. is judged on CET conducted by the Shivaji University, Kolhapur. Orientation Programmes were conducted for the students seeking admission to the courses said.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

The remedial courses are run in subjects like Physics, Chemistry, Accountancy and English for the students who are not up to mark in these subjects. A policy is adopted by the faculty of giving more explanations, simplification for such students in classes.

Home work, paper solutions are given for the benefit of advanced learners and oral instructions are given to them regarding their progress in the studies. Extra library facilities are provided to improve their merit in university examination.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)? The learning ability of the students is reflected in the results of the qualifying examination. The advanced and slow learners are identified by the teacher in day to day teaching in the class, on the basis of marks obtained by the students in the university examinations. The learning ability of the students is judged in classroom through discussions, asking questions, the performance in surprise tests, internal tests, oral questions, practical skills in laboratories, their queries and difficulties.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organise the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The academic calendar is prepared at the beginning of the academic year. It includes academic terms, examination schedules, holidays, schedules of sports, N.C.C. activities, N.S.S. camps, annual social gathering and some special days. Head of each department holds a meeting with his/her staff members to discuss and distribute work of curricula. The topics to be taught are distributed to the faculty members. The monthly teaching plan is prepared by the teachers and submitted to their respective Head of the Departments. Extra lectures are conducted if required according to the teaching plans.

The examination committee finalizes the schedules of unit tests, home assignments, practical tests and oral tests. The assessment of answer books is done by teachers concerned and the results are submitted to the committee. After evaluation the students are given proper instructions and guidelines for writing an ideal answer paper.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

IQAC monitors the overall academic activities in the college. In the beginning of the academic year; the IQAC prepares the plan and schedule of activities to be carried out for the year, which includes:

- 1. Preparation of academic calendar and its implementation
- 2. Teaching plans from each faculty
- 3. Schedule of internal university examination
- 4. Analysis of the results of previous years
- 5. Feedback forms of faculty concerned

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the student?

The learning is made student centric by organizing activities like seminars, group discussions, exhibitions etc. Facilities like open access to library and free broad band/WI-FI internet services are provided for final year students. The arrangement of workshops and seminars by the institute and other institutes in the neighborhood is made to enhance the knowledge of new trends among the students. N.S.S. activities contribute much to acquisition of life skills and lifelong learning. In Science faculty the interaction with students are found to be more effective during their practical.

Essay writing, elocution and debating, dance and music, cooking competitions, quiz etc. teach useful communication and develop leadership skills. Students learn life skills and management skills through interactions with eminent persons. Gymkhana activities encourage students to participate the co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

During day to day lectures the faculties motivate the students for critical thinking and creativity. During different programmes run by N.C.C. and N.S.S. Units (such as Nirmalya visarjan) scientific temperament is inculcated. Rallies related to AIDS awareness, sustainable environment are arranged. Some of the faculty members are actively engaged with Anti Superstitions movement in Maharashtra, Marathi Vidnyan Parishad, Sahyadri Hikers, Samajwadi Prabodhini, etc. who create awareness about citizenship among the students. Various cultural activities are helpful in creating social and scientific awareness. The faculty members write some books for creating scientific temperament in the society. Dr.S.D.Patil has written two books on Popular Science. Some of the faculty member write articles and publish them in periodicals.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? E.g.: Virtual laboratories, e-learning-resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The institute has an Audio-visual hall with a digital projector which makes learning more effective and interesting. Teachers are encouraged to use computer aided presentations. The internet facility is available in some departments, library and computer laboratories. Students have free broad band internet facility available through WI-FI for academic purpose. Some faculties make use of ICT. The students of computer science and B.C.A., B.C.S. courses use internet facility in their regular practical course. Our faculty members use inflibnet facility. Our library has e-books, periodicals and journals. This plays an important role in effective learning.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

The faculty keeps pace with the latest developments by attending refresher courses, orientation courses, national and

international seminars, workshops and conferences. Some teachers have published their research papers in journals, books and magazines. Student also actively participate in workshops and seminars conducted by lead college, which is beneficial for them. Various research projects by the faculty also keep them abreast with the recent developments in the respective subjects.

During regular lectures the faculty members convey the recent developments to the students.

The library arranges book exhibitions during annual social. Various departments encourage students to collect and display newspaper cutting of the articles on the current issues in the respective subject. This helps to update the knowledge of the students. Periodicals, the recent titles on various subjects and CD's are made available in the college library.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students/benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advice) provided to students?

The faculty members advise the students continuously according to needs related to their personal and social problems. PowerPoint shows are arranged for academic and career counseling. We arrange Lead college workshops. Counseling and coaching for competitive examination department of tahshil level from 2011-12. We have got counseling and coaching department in the college. Our college was chosen for developing tahshil level center for competitive exams in the year 2011-12. As a part of this scheme we received some financial assistance in the same year from District Planning and Development Council, (DPDC) Kolhapur.

The institute encourages the faculty for attending outside workshops, seminars and conferences to keep in touch with modern methodology and for knowledge sake.

Our library has 62000 books and 46 Periodicals. It helps our faculty to make their teaching effective. Our faculties enrich and update their knowledge by making use of reference books in Encyclopedia periodicals.

Text books, reference books, periodicals, learning through internet, N- list facility, and Inflibnet facility are made available for teachers and students. Automation of library, Data entry work is completed and bar-coding work is in process. Online issue return for staff in use. Text books are issued to student as periodically of the classes concerned. Meritorious and sportsmen and needy students are provided sets of books in free of charge. Open access for faculty, last year students and PG students etc.

New arrivals communicated to staff and student through notice board, SMS, Email and social network services. About 3000 books are made available to students for preparing their various competitive examinations.

Local and clock hour basis (CHB) appointments are also made as and when necessary through the Local Selection Committee. In addition visiting faculty is also appointed as required. The college has adequate number of qualified and competent teachers to carry on the courses.

Yes, there is a provision of teacher's evaluation by students which is done at the end of every academic year. For appraisal of teacher's performance, questionnaire is prepared, which is filled by the students. Feedback is then analyzed in the departmental meetings and Head of Department conveys it to the Principal. Concerned teachers are informed orally by the Principal about the student's assessment. This helps to improve teaching and overall performance.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The examination committee prepares the schedule of internal tests such as home assignments, unit tests, practical tests, projects, oral tests etc. Heads of the departments maintain record of internal tests. University conducts the final examinations for all classes. Internal tests help to know the progress and performance of the students. From the academic year 2008-09, university has adopted 80:20 examination patterns. According to this scheme, college conducts written and oral tests for 20 marks and the theory examination of 80 marks is conducted by Shivaji University, Kolhapur. Semester pattern is introduced for first year degree course from academic year 2009-2010.

The schemes of examination and evaluation method are communicated to the students through the discussion in the classroom at the beginning of the academic year. The tentative dates of examination are displayed on the student's notice board one month before the commencement of university examinations. The schedules of examinations are displayed at least fifteen days before the examination. The university circular about the scheme of examination is shown to the heads of the departments, faculty and administrative staff.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The major evaluation reforms initiated by the institution are:

- 1. Formation of examination committee.
- 2. Conducting internal examinations.
- 3. As per 80:20 pattern of Shivaji University for Arts and Commerce faculty, the college conducts internal examination of 20 marks.

The major evaluation reforms initiated by the University are:

- 1. Use of codes on the question paper instead of nomenclature and paper numbers maintains secrecy.
- 2. Computerization of examination work.
- 3. Adopting Central Assessment program.(CAP)
- 4. Implementation of the system of moderation of answer books.
- 5. Implementation of 80:20 pattern for the B.A.-I, B.Com.-I classes from the academic year 2008-09. Semester pattern from academic year 2009-10 for all classes of degree courses.
- 6. Declaration of examination results within 45 days.

To implement above reforms effectively, examination committee is formed, and through it the changes are brought to the notice of students and faculty so that the students can prepared for the examinations accordingly. Considering the changes, extra classes are arranged to complete the syllabus in time.

The examination pattern is changed from annual to semester as per guidelines of university. Previously when annual examination pattern was implemented, the percentage of passing and percentage of marks scored by the student are less but due to semester pattern of examination the percent of passing and percentage scored by students is increased as the students feel the semester pattern feasible.

The performance of the slow learner is communicated through convenient mechanism to their parents. Parents visit the Principal and teacher to discuss the progress of their wards. Some student's files are maintained and discussions are made regarding the students performance in occasional parents meet.

- The extension activities sponsored by the Shivaji University, Kolhapur have been adopted by the college. College runs several extension programmes to guide senior citizens, farmers and society in general.
- Our N.S.S. volunteers and N.C.C. cadets carry out Tree Plantation programme through which the concept of one student with one plant is initiated and worked out.
- Department of chemistry is engaged in soil and water analysis for the farmers of nearby region. The soil and water samples given by the farmers are analyzed free of cost along with the guidelines for proper management of soil and water.
- Blood donation camps are organized twice in a year and about 100 bags are supplied to the Annasaheb Galatage blood bank, Gadhinglaj.
- N.C.C. cadets and N.S.S. volunteers participated in Pulse Polio vaccination, Ganesh Festival, National and State assembly elections. Various departments and the faculty are rendering a very significant service to the society.
- Our institution conducts extension activities by keeping the need of community in mind.

• The institution tries to obtain to participation of villagers in N.S.S. camps. Through the various activities cited above, the institution works for holistic development of students and to make them good citizens.

Wallpaper display is one of the innovative activities of wallpaper committee where hand sketches, poems and popular articles of the students are displayed regularly. Similarly during the annual social gathering various competitions such as Rangoli, Pak-Kala, and Mehendi are held regularly.

The Library provides entire set of textbooks to such students and whenever the students need books other than text books, they are issued on their desks. Most of the laboratories being on ground floor, physically handicap students get easy access for particals. For physically disabled students RAMP is provided.

In order to motivate students, to improve their skills in various games and sports activity: trained experts coach the students, right from the entry in college and provide assistance for regular practice. Some extraordinary sportsmen belonging to the alumni also regularly visit the college to provide guidance and training to the sportsmen.

• Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.

The college has close association with Bharatiya Arogya Dham, Gadhinglaj. Doctors from this organization provide medical assistance whenever required.

The students are insured under the general health insurance scheme.

Organizing coaching classes for competitive examinations

We have separate library facilities and reading room for the students concern. Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.,)

There is no such provision in the curricula of the University to provide computer skills for all students. The subjects like Computer Science, Physics, Mathematics, Statistics in Science Discipline and a Course like B.B.A. provide satisfactory Knowledge in Computer Literacy. The college encourages the students to study the courses like MS-CIT. Physics, Statistics Departments are equipped with computers which are used during practical. Through these efforts, an attempt is made to make the students to acquire basic knowledge of computer and Internet facility.

Many workshops and activities have been designed and are run by Computer Science department which helps the students to acquire computer skills as per specific requirements of employment opportunities. There are 200 computers in the institution. The internet facility is available in administrative office, Computer Science Department, Library and NAAC Office.

Various career oriented courses and MOU with Karox provide the opportunities for the students to develop computer skills.

A course of Spoken English for undergraduate students was conducted by the faculty members Dr.Sou.S.A.Mujumdar, Shri.P.A.Ghulanawar who had undergone the relevant training at INFOSYS – Technological Training Center.

The college runs various COC's for under graduate students in college:

English: Personality Development and Communication Skills Physics: Maintains of Electric and Electronic Appliances

Chemistry: Certificate Course in Medical Laboratory Technology

Support for "slow learners"

The learning ability of the students is reflected in the results of the qualifying examinations. The advanced and slow learners are identified by the teacher in day to day teaching in the class on the basis of marks obtained by the students in the internal examinations. The learning ability of the students is judged in classroom through discussions, by asking questions, by the performance in surprise tests, internal tests, and oral questions, practical skills in laboratories, their queries and difficulties.

For slow learners, extra lectures are arranged as per the requirement. The methodologies used by the teachers are essentially learner centered. A repetition of practical in science faculty instills confidence in slow learners for improvements and to understand the underlying principles deeply. Before the commencement of the university practical examinations, the theoretical principles and procedures of the experiments are explained.

Similarly enrichment lectures, group discussions, quiz and seminars are arranged to facilitate advanced learners. Articles and advertisements published in magazines are displayed on the notice board for benefit of the academically ambitious students and the faculty helps them with special lectures and guidance.

Home work, paper solutions and oral instructions are given for the benefit of advanced learners. Oral instructions are given to them regarding their progress in the studies and also the college provides them extra library facilities.

Publication of student magazines 'SHIVAYAN' Wall Paper:

The college provides proper platform to encourage students' creativity in writing the literary forms like articles, poems, plays etc. The college displays the wall magazine like Shivayan. The college has kept this practice for the last 30 years and hundreds of students are provided opportunity to express their life experiences in the form of articles, drawings etc.

College annual magazine:

'The college magazine' is one of the best traditions that the college has maintained. The magazine 'SHIVRAJ' is published every year without fail. There are three- four sections like English, Marathi, Hindi in which students give their articles as per their choice and interst. Almost all the college activities are replected in such magazine.

5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills, among the students and the impact of the efforts.

The college organizes following activities to encourage and develop the entrepreneurial skills.

Soft skill development:

The Institute is consistently trying to develop the personality and confidence of economically poor and marginalized students from rural background through various activities. These include training for Spoken English, group discussion and personal interviews.

The college arranges CET coaching for B.B.A., B.C.A., B.C.S. and M.B.A. entrance examinations. SHIVRAJ CHEM-MQUIZ is arranged every year by Department of chemistry for B.Sc.-III students. This inter-college activity helped the students of B.Sc.-III (chemistry) for the M.Sc. entrance examination.

The students of Statistics Department also participate in the Quiz conducted by SUSTA. This activity was organized at our college during the year 2008-09.

The students of our college participate in "Yuva Mahotshav" arraged by Shivaji University, Kolahpur.

Study tour and industrial visit:

The study tours and industrial visits are organized to train the students about entrepreneurship. The students are also doing projects in industries which help them to acquire technical knowledge. Most of the departments organize excursion, study tours, industrial visits, project link-up. These activities improvise skills and knowledge.

The efforts made by institute are fruitful in developing overall personality of the students.

Good citizen:

The important goal of higher education is to groom students as good citizens. The students are not only trained to qualify the examinations based on curriculum, but, also to know about their responsibilities as a member of society. The students are advised to follow the rules and regulations laid down by the Society and the Government. The students are made aware of the values and importance of democratic Principles.

The college runs soft skill development activities which are useful to develop the communication skills and personality of students.

The following short term programmes and activities are run by the college to develop the overall personality of students with activities like life skill development, career training, community orientation and personality development.

Life skills:

a) The soft skill programme is run by the college to develop the confidence among rural, economically poor and marginalized

students. In this program, the students are trained in Spoken English, Interview Technique and developing their personalities. The details about the programmes organized are given below:

SACS

There is a Shivraj Association of Computer Students (SACS) in the college. The association organizes a function every year since 2003 for motivating the students to build their career and create the awareness about the development of software. The function includes events like:

- 2. Programme contest- Enhances the knowledge and logic of the programme in different computer languages which help them in their future career.
- 3. Quiz Contest- Makes them aware of the latest developments and technologies in computer era. SACS is a university level activity. The Students from different colleges of Sangli, Satara, Kolhapur, Karad and Gadhinglaj participate in the activity.

All those who show excellence are motivated to participate in various events at the institutional, intercollegiate, interuniversity, interstate as well as national and international level. The cultural declarations, notices are brought to the notice of student's wide circulation and exposure. A team of faculty members extends necessary expertise for better performances. The participants and winners are appreciated by awarding prizes as well as publicity. Obviously, more and more students actively approach and participate under able guidance to exhibit their extracurricular potential at various platforms.

Cultural activity:

The College offers opportunities to the students so that the students can participate in the activities like singing, instrumental music, drawing, group dance, Rangoli, elocution, debate and many more. The team of faculty members guides the students to participate in various activities at college, inter-collegiate and university level.

The functions are arranged on birth anniversaries of great personalities like Karmveer Vitthal Ramaji Shinde, Shahu Maharaj, Mahatma Gandhi and Savitribai Phule. The lives of these great personalities inspire the students.

Sports and Games:

The college has a spacious playground consisting of a 400 m Running track, sections for various sports and games like Football, Kabbadi, Kho-Kho, Volleyball, etc. are available. The well-equipped gymnasium has remained the centre of the attraction for boys and girls. We have a separate gymnasium for girls. The director of physical education and his expert team which consists of able staff members encourage the meritorious sports men and women to take admission in the college. The excellent infrastructure is provided by the college to the sports persons to make achievements in sports at intercollegiate, Zonal, University as well as State level events. Incentives are given to the outstanding sportsmen. The Physical director motivates and guides during sports activity.

- 3. Re-examination facility is available in case sportsmen could not attend the internal examination.
- 4. Adequate facilities like equipments, ground preparation and personal guidance are provided to improve their performances.

In order to motivate students, to improve their skills in various games and sports activity, trained Experts coach the students right from the entry in college and provide assistance in regular practices. Some extraordinary sportsmen belonging to the alumni also regularly visit the college to provide guidance and training to the sportsmen.

Career training:

The students get acquainted with career opportunities through the guest lecturers of eminent personalities from various fields.

These courses develop career oriented life-skills in the students and these skills are useful in the long run of their life. These courses are open to all students of the college. The courses being of interactive nature, the students get an opportunity to have a dialogue with the resource persons.

Cultural activity: The College provides healthy atmosphere so that the students can participate in the activities like singing, instrumental music, drawing, group dance, Rangoli, elocution, debate and many more. The team of faculty members guides the students to prepare for participation in various activities at college, inter-collegiate and university level.

Bodybuilding coaching and competition are the special features of the college. A few college body-builders have won prizes at state and national level also.

Every year, this activity is inaugurated at the hands of renowned author or a poet. This activity has become very popular and every week students compete for entry through better performances. Every year the best presenters are awarded with special prizes. This promotes and motivates many students.

College Annual Magazine:

The college publishes magazine, "SHIVRAJ" at the end of every academic year. The members of editorial board appeal to the students to submit the write ups related to curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. This material is scrutinized by the editorial board. The selected material is published in the magazine. The major publications brought out by students include articles, poems, essays, and letters written in Marathi, Hindi and English. The magazine also incorporates college diary of various activities/events of the academic year highlighting the achievements to stakeholders. The achievements in various activities like University results, participation in cocurricular and extra-curricular are also presented. The reports from various committees are also highlighted and are given wide publicity to those who have shown excellence and outstanding quality. The photographs of meritorious students from academic field, sports, N.C.C./NSS, cultural activities, student's council and some important events are published in the Magazine.

Other publication:

The students are also guided and supported to send their literature or material to participate in essay competition, poster presentation in various competitions and workshops held at inter-collegiate, inter-university, inter-state as well as at national level. Last year (2012-2013) a special issue on Gender equality and sensitization was published. It was the sole contribution of students.

5.3.5 Does the college have a Student Council or any similar body? Give details on its selection, constitution, activities and funding.

Yes, the college establishes a student council every year as per Maharashtra University Act 1994, (40). According to Maharashtra University act 1994, 4 (3), one student representative is elected as University Representative. Students Council is constituted every year as per the norms of university statutory provision with one elected University Representative (UR). The Students Council meets at least twice a year to regulate the academic and other co-curricular activities of students. The constitution of Students Council is given below. All the details of the election process are communicated to the Director, Students Welfare Board, Shivaji University, Kolhapur.

The constitution of student's council is as follows:

- 1. President (Principal of the college).
- 2. One faculty member as Principal's nominee.
- 3. In-charge of N.C.C.
- 4. Program officer of NSS.
- 5. Director of Physical education.
- 6. One student each nominated by Principal as a representative from sports, N.S.S., N.C.C. and cultural activities.
- 7. Two girl students nominated by Principal.
- 8. One student representative from each class selected on the basis of merit

One student is elected as University representative amongst the students' representatives. The election procedure is followed as per the University guidelines. The university organizes the meetings of University Representatives from each college two or three times every year. The college provides financial assistance required for the meetings and other activities of the student council. The fund generated from students aid fund is utilized for the development and various activities undertaken by the institution. The society also contributes its share to supplement the needs. The infrastructure and major development activities are undertaken through supervision and guidance of independent local management council, purchase committee, building committee, local management committee as well as other statutory committees constituted as per the academic requirements. The Principal is a statutory member of all executive committees, cited above.

This helps to improve teaching and overall performance of the teachers.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The N.S.S. Programme Officer and N.C.C. Officer are deputed to undergo their respective training when required/arranged by respective authorities. The faculty members of the institute actively participate in various training programs such as Training for Revised Syllabus arranged by university and various colleges. Similarly Administrative staff is also deputed for various training programmes organized by University, Zilla Parishad and Education Dept. etc.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

• Self Appraisal:

Performance assessment is necessary to improve quality in teaching and in service. The performance assessment is done with help of the self-appraisal method. The self-appraisal report consists of the regarding teaching. regularity, information and punctuality. innovations/contributions in teaching, improvement of professional competence, research contributions, community service, and participation in corporate life activities. At the end of the year, members of teaching staff fill up this Self Appraisal Form which is as per UGC guidelines. A person nominated by the Principal, usually, head of the department verifies the data and forwards the Appraisal Report. The Principal interacts with the concerned teacher if certain improvement/quality enhancement is necessary in respect of teaching, research etc.

• Assessment by Students:

Students make most realistic assessment of teacher's performance, which is the end product of the teaching-learning processes. The students assess their teachers from their point of view and reflect their opinions in the feedback-forms made available to them. Such feedback summarizes the teaching performance of the teacher on various fronts as seen by the students. The requirements of the students are conveyed to respective teacher orally so that he/she can develop teaching methodology as per student's requirements.

The performance appraisal of administrative staff is done at the end of every academic year as per university norms. The Principal goes through these appraisals and interact with the concerned staff if certain improvement is necessary in respect of their responsibilities.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The Principal reviews the performance appraisal of teaching and non-teaching staffs and communicates to the management. The decisions taken by management are conveyed to the respective stakeholders by Principal.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

The members of teaching and non-teaching staff have opted for pension scheme of Govt. of Maharashtra. All the teaching and nonteaching staff approved for salary grant are eligible to get the expenditure reimbursed in case of malignant diseases as per the list approved by Govt. of Maharashtra (Annexure-I).

The management gives due consideration to the employees in case of admission in the college and in job opportunities on fulfilling the conditions of qualification. Television and indoor games are made available to the staff.

The college helps faculty and administrative staff for getting loans from Provident Fund (Annexure-II) and the Santsha like Shri. Sane Guruji Shikshak Sevkanchi Sahakari Patsanstha Maryadit, Gadhinglaj, Shri. Shiv-Shahu Shikshak Sevkanchi Sahkari Patsanstha Maryadit, Gadhinglaj.

Leave Travel Concession Scheme is offered by the Govt. of Maharashtra once in four years for the family tour of the administrative staff within the state only. Traveling expenses are reimbursed through the college. (Annexure III).

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

The teaching staff is recruited as per UGC guidelines, the rules of Govt. of Maharashtra and the statute of Shivaji University Kolhapur by advertising the posts in newspapers, University News and Shivaji University Website. Recruitment of qualified, skilled personnel is made through interviews by committee constituted by Shivaji University, Kolhapur.

The non-teaching staff is recruited as per the cadre-wise vacancies and the recruitment rules of the University and Government of Maharashtra.

The staff attrition rate is almost Nil due to....

- Healthy campus atmosphere
- Appreciation of work
- Timely promotions and placements
- Welfare facilities.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The LMC prepares and monitors the annual budget. The Principal forms various committees such as Purchase Committee, Building Committee; Vikas Nidhi Viniyog Samittee etc. for effective utilizational of financial resources. The respective committees put the requirements before the Principal. The office prepares the internal office note for sanctioning the budget.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

- 1. The institute has appointed internal auditor C.A. D.Y.Bhumkar, Kolhapur. The Audit is completed every year. The accounts are audited up to the financial Year 2013-14.
- 2. Audit by Joint Director, Kolhapur Region, Kolhapur completed up to the year 2011-12.
- 3. Audit by Senior Auditor, Higher Education, Kolhapur Region, Kolhapur completed up to the year 2001-02.
- 4. Audit by Accountant General, Mumbai completed up to the year 2001-02.

The objections raised by these have been fulfilled, compliances are made and reports are appended. (Annexure IV).

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

The major source of institutional funding are Salary Grant from State Government, EBC and BC Scholarships from State Government and Central Government, various grants from UGC, fees from students and donations.

The audited income and expenditure statement of previous four years are appended (Annexure V).

While dealing these affairs, care is taken that there should not be any deficit. There is no reserve/corpus fund as such.

The college does make the efforts for securing additional funding and makes the proper utilization of the funds. The additional funds are made available from UGC and Non Grant Section in the college. And they are utilized for Workshops, Seminars, Minor Research Projects, COC, Remedial Courses, and Language Laboratory and for the development of infrastructure.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

The institution was established IQAC on 29th September, 2004 and since then it is working to maintain institutional policy with regards to quality assurance.

Institute takes the initiative in providing the quality assurance in all aspects of the college activities. The faculty is encouraged in doing research work, attending workshop, seminars at university, state and national level.

The students making extra ordinary achievements in examinations, sports, NSS, N.C.C. are felicitated for their performances. The students economically poor are given assistance in the form of monitory benefits, moral supports and library facilities. For competitive examinations, the students are assisted by providing additional library facilities like books, reading room, extra lectures and personal counselling.

The administrative staff is deputed for various workshops, seminars and is encouraged for improving their qualifications.

Almost all decisions of IQAC have been approved by the Management through LMC. Most of the approved decisions were implemented to the maximum extent.

CRITERION VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 Environmental Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

The institute does not conduct a green audit of its campus as such, but making it eco-friendly, some efforts are made.

7.1.2. What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

Energy conservation –

For the sake of Energy Conservation; the college uses CFL bulbs in most of the locations in the campus. While making new construction of Women's hostel and reading room, care is taken that there would be minimum use of electricity. Ideal ventilation and proper illumination are maintained.

Use of Renewable Energy –

The college uses solar energy in Principal cabin, meeting hall and in office.

Water Harvesting –

The college does harvest water for Chemistry lab. The institute has decided to harvest the rain water from women's hostel terrace.

Check- Dam construction(CDC) –

The college does not have any appropriate site for CDC.

Efforts for Carbon neutrality –

The college has developed a beautiful garden and road side plantation. Wherever possible, college has made plantation of evergreen trees, flowering plants and some decorative plants. Trees are planted along with road side compound wall to prevent dust and provide eco-friendly parking. Under a minor research project carried out by Dr. S.K. Nerle, some herbal plants representing this region and Western Ghats are planted and maintained in pots in the college garden. Various decorative plants are developed in pots which are kept in corridors and appropriate locations.

Plantation-

Hazardous west Management:-

There is no hazardous waste as such generated in the college campus, but waste water from chemistry laboratory is drained out through pipeline.

> e-Waste Management –

There is no major e-waste generated in the campus; but outdated computers are stored and vendor through proper channel for recycling.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

Teaching Aids:-

In order to make teaching process effective, we have modern equipments like LCD Projectors, Laptops and caller microphones etc. We have established an English Language Lab. for teaching phonology, language sounds, word accent and intonations.

✤ Office: -

Our office is atomized with advance technology and software. We have office automation software; all computers in the office are interconnected with LAN and Internet facilities.

✤ Library :-

Our library is automated; our teaching staff is registered with N-list consortium of INFLIBNET, Ahemadabad. For making maximum and effective use of periodicals, the index and the names of articles are conveyed to the library users by e-mail.

Teaching Staff :-

We have qualified teaching staff .**Twenty two** teachers have completed their Ph.D. degree, **17** teachers have completed M.Phil./NET/SET and **8** teachers have registered for Ph.D. degree. One staff member has been availed the facility of FDP from UGC. Seven Faculty members of our college have undertaken Minor research projects funded by UGC.

Our faculty members are encouraged for their research work, project work, for participating in conferences, seminars, workshops, Orientation and refresher courses.

Some of our faculty members give guest lectures, public talks and have conducted some workshops which are beneficial for students as well as society.

Competitive Exam and Sports :-

The college has got well equipped library, which encourages the students in making career as creative writers. Our library provides facilities to our students, faculties and even to outside students for their research and preparation of competitive exams.

Additional reading room facility is provided to the students aspiring for competitive examinations. These facilities have considerably increased the number of readers and students appearing for competitive exams.

We have a nice playground with 400 m running track, Gymkhana and Sports equipments. Hundreds of sportsmen and women have proved their merit at state and national level. There is a considerable increase of students in uniform services like police, army etc.

All these achievements have made a positive impact on strength of the college.

7.3 Best Practices

7.3.1. Elaborate on any two best practices

1. Title:-

Best Practice-I

The role of Gymkhana in personality development of the players.

2. Goals:-

- To create physically well-built, energetic and efficient citizens for the society.
- To develop sportsmanship and democratic spirit and democratic behavior among the students.
- To imbibe the life values like co-operation, healthy competition and result oriented effort amongst the youths.
- To equip the students with the qualities like endurance and patience
- ➤ To create social culture, the virtues like self esteem and patriotic feelings.
- To prepare deserving students for employment, uniform services and for further careers.

3. Context:-

It is the experience that most of the players come to the college are from economically poor families. They cannot afford proper diet, fruits, proper coaches and grounds easily. The sports department in the college provides financial aids to the needy students. Many of these students have no ideas about their own abilities. Through search, such students are identified and made aware of their abilities. The students participating in sports at State and National level are helped by providing them travel, lodging, boarding expenses.

The college has a large and enough play ground with 400 m running track for the players. We provide ground facilities not only to our players but also for sport events like summer and winter taluka level, zonal and state level competitions of football and other games of the Schools, Clubs and Sports organizations. The college ground is unique in three tahasils- Gadhinglaj, Ajara and Chandgad. As a result, student players prefer our college for their admission. Most of the physical directors and Physical Education teachers in this area are our college products. They also motivate their students for getting admissions in the college. We respond these students positively in giving admission in various classes.

4. Practice:-

Once the college admissions are over, the physical director and a few senior players call all the players on the ground for selecting their events. Their ability in various sports and games is identified and practice is given accordingly.

When the students are free from their periods, they are trained and motivated for rigorous practice. The college organizes competitions among the players themselves. This process helps the college in selecting better, genuine players.

The players in the college are made aware of the importance of strong physique in sports and games. The body building and power lifting exercises are taught to the players in the gymkhana. It is the most effective and efficient way to strengthen and develop muscles of the body. Lot of counseling is made in this regard. The things like warm-up, cooling down, nutrients and the rest are all discussed with players. These are the fundamental and common things in running jumping and throwing events. Today's players know that the best athlete is the best body builder. The workout done in the gymkhana makes the players, strong, agile and confident. The players are made to know that the body building exercise makes the player's circulatory and respiratory systems strong and efficient.

Small batches of 20 students are made and asked to do the exercise in the gymkhana by rotation. The players in the throwing events need powerful arm and shoulders. The coach focuses the upper body muscle groups and trains the players for throwing events. The football players and wrestlers are asked to give more attention to build thigh and calf muscles in particular. The recent study has shown that the building of total body is important for games and sports.

The training in the gymkhana and practice on the ground are combined and the result is that most of the years the college has won university general championship.

Enough financial help is given to the economically backward players. In addition, the professors like Shri.S.G.Munj, provides personal assistance for diet, sportswear and bus passes etc. The college gives them relaxation in exam fees and admission fees. The college provides shoes, kits, spikes and other sport materials at free of charge to the students. The college does have some players that have participated at international level.

All the sports activities are run under able guidance of the Physical Director, Shri.R.D.Magdum.

5. Evidence of Success:-

The College has established a very rich tradition in the field of sports and games, particularly in athletics. For the last two years, college has won General Championship in athletics at the University level. Our lady athlete team has retained zonal athletic championship successively for two years.

For the last three years, continuously our girls have won ladies Cross- country general championship at university level. A few other achievements are:

The events in which the college produced extraordinary players are: Body- building, Hockey, Athletics, Cross- Country, Cricket, Kho-Kho, Kabbadi, Football, Boxing, and Fencing etc. All the players are trained in the college as it has enough playgrounds, sportinfrastructure, Gymkhana, (Men and Women) sports and gymkhana equipments and materials like shot put, disk throw and javelin throw.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:-

The problems faced and solutions worked out:

- Financial problems for player as they come from poor families.
- Event wise experts are not available due to our college in remote area. We cannot make the experts available easily.
- Experts like sports counselor Specialists in sports physiology, sports psychology are not easily available.
- During college hours sufficient practice and training cannot be given to the players. We cannot call them after office hours or in the evening because the students coming here are from far- off-places. To compensate this, during competition period extensive training is given.
- For indoor games we do not have ample space in the existing gym. To overcome the problem a new multipurpose sports complex is under construction.
- Accommodation, particularly for girls, is not available in the premise. Therefore the girls are unable to make sufficient practice. The college ladies hostel is under construction and is in the completion stage. This would be a good solution to overcome the problem cited above.

- 2. Goal:-

 - To develop presentation skill.

Apart from regular computer teaching, students are motivated to develop various skills through competitions. The department has organized National level competition to provide exposure to our students. We hope that through these competitions, we can develop communication skills, the skill of working as a team and the skill of completing work in time constraint. We arrange such competitions to make the students aware of new trends in IT industry.

3. Context:-

Most of the students coming to the college are from rural areas, and they are rather inactive and passive in getting computer knowledge and in developing proper aptitude for it. It is rather a challenge to create computer literate generation, exactly with this intention; we have formed Shivraj Association of Computer Students (SACS).

We invite renowned personalities and masterminds on the occasion of quizzes and competitions. The students are inspired by listening the key note addresses and rich experience narrated on such occasions. Such activities are arranged by the students particularly. They develop among themselves the skill of working together and handling the activity with proper plans and responsibility.

4. The Practice:-

The SACS unit of the college organizes several competitions for the students of B.C.S., B.C.A., B.Sc. (Computer), B.B.A., and P.G. students of M.C.A. and M.Sc. (Computer). The college thinks that these activities are beneficial to develop student's personality and knowledge. Such events help the students in updating their computer knowledge and in developing the technical abilities needed for the field of computer.

All the activities run by the SACS are organized under the guidance of Shri.C.S.Nikam, Head, and Department of Computer Science.

The events included in such activity are: Paper Presentation, Computer Programming, Quiz contest and Advertising competition. Large number of students from different colleges (District, State and National) participates in the said competitions. The college provides refreshment, meals and accommodations to the participants. For this, minimum registration fees are charged. All the activities of SACS are organized by computer students in the college. At the beginning of ever academic year the various computer competitions are announced and advertised through Internet, newspapers and the posters displayed at various places.

The college communicates the date, nature and place of the competition to the various colleges about national level competition. The participants are asked to register their names for the particular competition of their choice. Each team consists of two members for various competitions. Maximum 10 teams from a college are allowed to participate in the competition.

The competitions held under this activity are:

• Paper- presentation -

Paper presentation is based on recent development in IT and computer science in general. The participants are allowed to present their paper on any topic from the themes given (e.g cloud-computing, Nano-technology). For each team 10 minutes are given to present the paper; then the discussion and suggestion are shared by judges and audience. The college provides LCD projector and OHP for the presentation of the paper.

• Computer Programming :-

In the first round, an aptitude test in conducted to test aptitude and inclination of the participants. The students selected are given an incomplete program with errors. The programs are based on C- language. The participants have to correct the program and complete it within the time given.

• Quiz Contest :-

The selected participants are called on the stage for the context. There are three rounds for the participants and after each round the names of poor performers are dropped. All the questions asked in such contest are based on IT and computer science.

• Advertisement :-

The topics for the advertisement activity are given to the participants on the spot. Only five minutes are given for preparation and the participants have to perform efficiently their voice quality, body language and presentation skills needed for the topic in the time given. The participants are given 2-3 minutes for presentation of the advertisement.

After the completion of all the contests, a felicitation function is arranged in which the college officials, members from management and few invited guests are present. The best performers of the contests receive awards and certificates as per their merit. A few officials and chief guest give their comments and express their views on the activities arranged.

• Evidence of Success:-

The college has collected and recorded the data regarding the success and achievements of the students in getting admissions to P.G. courses, employments, increased participation in SACS and obtaining fine results in B.Sc. and B.C.S. courses.

The students those have participated in the SACS like competitions have seen successful in getting jobs and services in various multinational companies and institutions like: Infosys, Wipro, Cognizant Technology Solutions, and Tata Consultancy Services etc.

This activity has created confidence, knowledge and skills among the students in facing interviews and getting services like: Project Manager, Software Engineer. Project Leader, System Analyst, BPO, Programmers, Testing Analyst etc.

Our students have participated in such activity organized by other colleges and won ranks and awards.

Compliances of the Suggestions by NAAC Peer Team

The compliances of all suggestions by the NAAC peer team are made by the institution and the compliances are:-

- The college authorities have consistently encouraged organise Seminars/Conferences/Workshops. The college has organized 2/3 Lead cluster activities every year. During the last four years the college has organized four workshops/seminars/conferences in the subjects of Chemistry, Commerce, English and Sociology. A part from these, University level workshops is organized on revised syllabus in Marathi, Economics etc. (Ref.)
- The college doesn't have recognized research center as such, but the research laboratory for physics and Chemistry is recognized by the University. The number of research guides is increased. Due to

encouragement 22 faculties have completed Ph.D degree and 07 M.Phil. in addition Nine faculty members have registered for Ph.D .

- The college has established a research committee to encourage and coordinate the research activities. The committee members meet periodically and make plans regarding the research progress and advancements. The research committee in co-ordination with UGC committee helps the faculty members is obtaining funds and finance from UGC for organizing seminars/conference/workshops and research projects.
- Library and reading room facilities are made available from 7.00am to 6.00pm every day. A month before and during exam period this service is extended up to 12.00 in the night. The college has provided extra space and room for library with self access of books particularly for final year and PG students. Photo copier is made available at the welcome desk in the college building.
- A placement cell is established and a faculty member Shri. Sudhir G. Munj works as in-charge of the cell. The cell arranges campus interviews and guest lecturers for the students. (Ref.)
- The college has established IQAC to monitor various activities and planning. IQAC in its first meeting of every academic year prepares a plan of activities. Various committees are established accordingly. During the periodic meetings of IQAC the progress of activities is reviewed.
- We are proud of our girl student Miss.Manisha Patil who secured top positions at the University and Inter University level in Swimming. Presently she is working as Sports officer in Satara District.

As per recommendations of NAAC peer team, the construction of swimming pool was under consideration by the management. Meantime Gadhinglaj Muncipal council has constructed a new swimming pool in the town. As we have cordial relations with Municipality, the swimmers of our college make use of this swimming pool, which is very near to the college. Therefore the idea of our own swimming pool was dropped.

- Some of our faculties are working as B.O.S members and members on various sub- committees for designing and revising the syllabi. The current syllabi of various classes fulfill the demands of students preparing for competitive exams. Project work is included in B.Com.-III syllabus.
- The college has communicated to NCC authorities for sanctioning a NCC girl's wing and we are looking forward to start the same.
- The University has semesterised all the courses from UG to PG level.
- The Girls Hostel is under construction and almost in completion stage.
- As per Peer Team recommendations more space is made available for almost all laboratories. Due to over whelming strength of science stream, the provisions made are insufficient. We are looking forward for further expansions.
- The strength of PG courses is increasing day –by-day. The full time faculties for P.G. courses are not available as the courses are unaided,

even then, the qualified visiting faculties, as per university norms, are appointed form neighboring colleges. Due to infrastructure limitations we are unable to establish separate departmental Libraries, but these students have open access in the Library.

- The bifurcating police of + 2 courses lies with the Government. The institute is following the same.
- All students willing for admission to various courses like B.B.A., B.C.A., and B.C.S. are given admissions. The SC/ST students get scholarship from the Government. For economically weaker student some concessions in fees and payments of fees in installment are given.
- The service conditions of faculties and administrative staff of self financing courses are always fair. The salaries paid to these are consolidated and negotiable.
- The college has always tried to keep the college campus clean, green, healthy and eco-friendly.
